
I would seriously encourage you to give the May Zoom meeting a try. If you think it will be too confusing, please see Dean's column above for instructions and help on signing up and participating.

So what have I actually been doing while holed up? Mostly laying track and wiring. As you probably know, I like to hand lay my rail. Using flex track is certainly easier and modern, properly weathered flex probably even looks better, but there is something very satisfying to me in driving those tiny spikes into wooden ties. I don't think I'm particularly good at it, but I enjoy it. However, if you are in a hurry, use flex track. Spiking your own is very time consuming.

The wiring has been a little frustrating. I've run out of two kinds of wire that I like and at different times so it took separate orders. In fact, I'm still waiting on one as I type this. My soldering iron died in the middle of the project, but that allowed me to buy a fancy new soldering station and to do so without guilt. Then, while heating up some shrink tubing, my heat gun fan jammed and I couldn't fix it. In the old days I used a soldering iron on shrink tubing, but that heat gun had me spoiled. A new one is on the way. Now I'm installing my remote manual turnout linkages while waiting for the wire and heat gun. This has been a challenge in a few places, but I am not deterred.

So all in all, I'm staying plenty busy while staying home. I hope you are, too. And send me pictures of your projects to share in TR&T. We all want to see what you're doing.

My grandson Miles needed a garage for his two cars from the movie "Cars." So Papa and Miles went to the basement and scratch built the needed garage.







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
KIT BASHED MINING SUPPLY By Larry Gulick





Two were purchased and you can see by the pictures what happened. I thought that the roofs were a weak point, so I changed all of them except one.












Some of these items will be used to enhance my "scratch-building" of the "Work Caboose" I've been attempting during this quarantine period of time.

After washing in warm soap and water and drying, I then trimmed the "flash" off them. I took the tape and rolled it so it was sticky side out and stuck the pieces/parts to the bottom of a garden center box. From left to right: 55 gallon drums; two rows of 4' work benches with tools atop; then a 6' work bench; and finally an 8' work bench.





I took them outside and sprayed with gray primer...now they are "breathing" the fumes off
