FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK BY JIM MARLETT

It seems like just yesterday that the last Trails, Rails, and Tales was published. I shouldn't be surprised. Summers always seem to pass quickly and after living through 77 of them, you'd think I would be better prepared.

The three main articles in this issue are the Mid-Continent Region Convention, the adventures of the Chisholm Trail modular group at Day of the Cowboy, and Phil Aylward's open house at Halstead's Old Settlers Days. There seems to be a unifying theme – sharing the hobby of model railroading with others.

Down in my basement, the engine facilities for the San Juan Southern narrow gauge are coming along slowly. "Big Larry" Fremont, the railroad's president, needs to whip the crew into shape or it will never get done!

Big Larry and the crew were debating whether or not to make it longer than the architects called for and they decided to go for it. The foundation and stem wall are "poured" and the bricklayers are finishing up the outer wall. Next will come the carpenters since my model shows later years where Big Larry decided to expand four of the six stalls even farther back. But you can just follow along with the pictures.


I cut pieces from two stall addition kits to add to the length of the roundhouse. I cut them to the length I wanted to lengthen it and saved the scrap, which I used later.



Above: A K-27 locomotive just barely fits lengthwise. A K-28, K-36, or K37 won't. It isn't clearly seen in this picture, but the same is true of height. Below: I cut some back wall pieces to make extensions for longer side walls.



Right: Because the inside walls and outside walls are different, I knew the windows wouldn't line up with each other when repurposed. Fortunately, I had a plan. Also note that I added some bricks to the upper top portion of the wall so the space above the roof wouldn't show the plane vertical gluing surface that was exposed when not using parts as intended.



Right: Since I moved the back walls farther back and actually lowered them for a better roof fit, I had to cut some off the bottom to keep from lowering the back stem wall and to get the brick patterns to line up.



Left: Once I had everything like I wanted it, I glued the back walls to the side walls using the template provided in the kit to get the proper angle.

Right: A test fit shows how much longer I made the roundhouse. The pencil lines show where the original walls would have been.



Left: Lengthening the wedge-shaped stalls meant that the back walls would have to be longer as well. I did this by gluing the scraps left over from making the extensions to the ends of the back walls. Notice that every sixth row of bricks is turned sideways. I had to match this pattern on every piece I glued together.

Left: I covered the un-patterned areas with surplus thin brick pieces that in the un-modified kit represented pilasters where back walls joined together.


Right: When the walls were essentially finished, I scratch built "concrete" stem walls from basswood. I used the template again to get the angle correct. This is just before it went to the paint shop. The blue tape is to make sure I could have a paint-free gluing surface when I was finished.


Left: I temporarily stacked the brick walls on the stem walls and placed them where the roundhouse will go. Now it's ready for the paint shop to get mortar, windows, and various details in place and do a bit of weathering. The rest of the roundhouse will be wood construction and will be pretty much all scratch built.

MODULAR GROUP UPDATE - DAY OF THE COWBOY

On Saturday July 22, The Chisolm Trail NMRA Modular Layout was on display at the "Pioneer Bluffs Day of the Cowboy Celebration" in Matfield Green. Pioneer Bluffs is an old, onceworking ranch located about a mile north of Matfield Green in the lush grass of the Kansas Flint Hills. They were hosting "The Day of the Cowboy" and the arrival of the Railroads in Matfield Green. There were Country Singers, a Cowboy Poet, and a Western Story Teller, playing to an audience outside of the large hay barn in a shaded green grass gathering area. We had our Modular Layout set up and operating inside of the hay barn. There was also a picnic area where people enjoyed the evening BBQ Brisket dinner and then the highlight of the evening came out as Homemade Ice Cream and Brownies with all the trimmings. (That was the first thing that distracted any of us from running our trains). It was a big success as people filed by to look at our display.

We set up the layout on Friday and ran trains all day Saturday. We had 10 members (two new members) running their trains of choice. We had of course Union Pacific SD 45TM's pulling freight. There were several different versions of the Santa Fe Chief ABBA's with Super Chief streamliners in tow. Another couple of very impressive passenger trains running were the Santa Fe "Blue Goose" steam engine complete with smoke bellowing from the front stack, and I think we had a brief peek at the Rock Island Rocket. Very impressive passenger trains, that brought out a lot of memories and conversation by the Pioneer Bluffs staff and visitors. We also witnessed some Santa Fe Blue and Yellow War

Bonnet freights and an occasional Rock Island pass by as well. I believe there also was an Ark Valley freight that set the high-speed record on our track speedometer. I don't recall the record speed, but ask Dean as I'm sure he will remember.

As I mentioned earlier, we felt it was a great weekend for the NMRA Modular. We met a lot of people from around the area that really enjoyed seeing our trains. Almost everyone who stopped to talk had a story of an old passenger train they rode, or a freight train that would pass by their house late at night. They loved hearing the whistles, bells and roar of the engines. Of course, we had kids running trains a lot, and I'm pretty sure some parents thinking they were going to have to buy a train set on the way home. Several of us felt it was really fun to set up the layout and run the trains for an audience that were not already modelers or train buffs, just people that loved the trains and talking about their memories. I almost forgot to mention that we were also just about a quarter of a mile from the BNSF Main, and you could hear train traffic going by all day long.

I'll close this up with a cute story of Charles's 7-year-old granddaughter. She was running one of Charles's trains at the time, and a reporter from the Emporia Gazette was interviewing her. The reporter must have said she knew a lot about trains for a 7-year-old and Lily's answer was "Me and My Grandpa have been doing this a long time." Great job Grandpa!

A fun time was had by all. It's a great time to be a member of the Chisholm Trail Division of the NMRA!




