

(Above) Jerry Bruce of McPherson, Kansas caught Concordia Terminal 2232. The 2232 is a **GP-7u**, owned by Midwest Locomotive leasing and sales (MWLX).

This locomotive was constructed in September of 1952 as **ATSF 2780** an EMD GP-7 and was later rebuilt to **GP-7u** standards. This unit also worked for the **CKRY** (Central Kansas Railway part of Kansas & Oklahoma) and **GWR** (Great Western Railway of Colorado) both as 2232.

In the early 1980's, Canadian Pacific rebuilt GP-7s and designated them GP7u units for yard service, including a chopped short hood, new number boards, front cab windows, upgrading the 567B prime movers with 645 power assemblies with "BC" engine block specs, and four exhaust stacks with spark arrestors.



NEW Atlas N Scale EMD SD7 and SD9

The Atlas Classic N Scale SD-7 Locomotive is based on the prototype manufactured by EMD from February 1952 to November 1953. Utilizing a 1,500 hp engine and a longer underframe than the GP-7, the SD-7 was the first locomotive to use EMD's Flexicoil truck.



HO Scale Pre Order: Rapido EMD SD9, SD7, SD10

The SD7 was General Motors Electro-Motive Division's first foray into 6-axle power. The "SD" stood for Special Duty, while the 7 was carried over for the 4-axle GP7 series. This new series of locomotives provided extra tractive effort spread and weight distribution across the six-axle trucks. Production lasted from May of 1951 to November of 1953. A total of 188 units were built for 17 railroads, from class Is to industrial operations. The SD7 would give way to the SD9.

Baldwin DR-4-4-1500



(From American-Rails.com) The **DR-4-4-1500** was the first domestically produced cab freight unit Baldwin offered to compete against Electro-Motive's extremely successful F series. Baldwin used two carbody styles for its road freight units; the original "Baby Face" design and later the more striking "Sharknose" design. Baldwin faced reliability issues with its early models; coupled with an unattractive design, the company sold few DR-4-4-1500s.

From the start, the DR-4-4-1500 was intended for freight service as a direct competitor against similar models from Electro-Motive (F series) and American-Locomotive (FA). If there was an area in which Baldwin struggled immensely, it was the cab market. The builder found few buyers for either its original "Baby Face" variant or later "Shark Nose" design. By the time production had ended just over 100 A and B units rolled out of Eddystone (most of which were purchased by the PRR).

In addition, it was nearly a decade late in releasing a cab design to compete against Electro-Motive. To Baldwin's credit, the builder continued refining its locomotives. The RF16, for example, was much more successful.



The DR-4-4-1500 utilized the builder's original 608SC prime mover. The DR-4-4-1500 could produce 1,500 horsepower and featured a B-B truck setup (two axles per truck).

Since Baldwin was still building a few steam locomotives when the DR-4-4-1500 was released, the company continued to utilize a version of the "Whyte Notation" classification system from the steam era. For example, the model's numbers and letters referred to the following:

- DR <u>D</u>iesel <u>R</u>oad unit
 4 Four overall axles
 4 Four powered traction motors
- 1500 The horsepower rating

The "Baby Face" design did not last long. Realizing it was unpopular, Baldwin contracted Hadley, Ryder & Pedersen for a complete carbody redesign. The company came up with the classic "Sharknose" concept, which gave Baldwin's late-era cab locomotives an entirely unique look. They were also tasked with arranging the interior equipment, stress analysis of the carbody, and working with Baldwin on the final overall design.

Contrary to popular railfan belief, the Sharknose was not a Raymond Loewy design. As John Kirkland points out in his book, "*The Diesel Builders: Volume Three (Baldwin Locomotive Works*," this idea likely derived from the carbody's similarity to Pennsylvania Railroad's streamlined 4-4-4-4 "Duplex Drive" T-1's. The angular nose of these famous steam locomotives, which as a Lowey inspiration, bore a striking resemblance to the Sharknose carbody.

Internally, the DR-4-4-15 featured components from Westinghouse Electric, which supplied Baldwin with virtually all its internal equipment for its diesel models (the two companies had been working in conjunction since the 19th century).

The builder's "Standard Line" was growing in demand when parent Westinghouse pulled Baldwin out of the locomotive market.







When the Scenery Crew of the WKR went looking for the required parts to start the detail upgrades for the Robinson Oil scene, we turned to Shapeways (<u>http://www.shapeways.com</u>).

You will find several pages of products already developed and refined by others that are available for purchase. (Right) This is a screen shot of one product, it will show the scale (N), how many are included (4x), the product name, the price (\$9.05), and the "handle" of the designer (Ngineer).

By clicking on the item, it displays several views of the item, lists the item features, and may describe other item necessary for a scene.


(Left) The ordered materials arrived in the mail. Shapeways is very good in their packing procedures and almost everything we have ordered has arrived intact.

In this case, I did not retrieve the mail from the box for a day in the hot Summer, so the large loading bridge (below) had a slight bow from the heat. Although this material is very brittle and easily broken, it was an easy fix using a hair dryer and slight pressure for it to resume its original straight lines.



(Above) The inventory from this last order includes: The long loading bridge, four local delivery trucks, two fuel trailers, four fuel loading cranes (small items will come in printed frames to prevent breakage), and two loading platforms which attach to the bridge structures.

The trucks and trailers will be added to the scene as part of Phase 2, while the rest will be added in Phase 3. All the 3-D printed items can benefit from a very gentle washing in soap and water to remove any oils, however if its small and delicate like handrails, don't try it. The trucks and trailers are solid, so they can take a good washing, but the other items would probably break. If items break, think of them as a "kit" and reassemble them using super glue.



(Left) Earlier, we purchased a truck loading platform. The roof was painted white with blue trim. The loading rack and stairs were painted a primer grey. The handrails were first painted white with several coats to cover the grey, then the top rails painted yellow. In the center, the pipes were painted aluminum. Since the structure must be removable, a platform was constructed from two pieces of 0.060 sheet styrene glued together, sanded, glued to the rack, then painted "aged concrete" color.

(left) Using copy paper and masking tape, we created a template for the truck loading and tank car unloading structures. We used the structures, put in place temporarily, to get a feel of how everything will fit in the allotted space. It was a tight fit, and we had to reposition several times.

(Right) Once the template was constructed, the lines were drawn to show the area of foam and gravel to remove. Since the gravel area was glued down, we used a Dremel moto tool with cut-off disk to cut the gravel along the lines for a smooth cut.





(Left) The tan section is where the foam "road" was removed, while the gravel was removed with a putty knife. This put quite a few cuts/ridges in the pink extruded foam base. These need to be smoothed out and solidified before construction can begin. A shop vac was used to remove any small debris before proceeding.

(Right) A quick trip to the local hardware store resulted in a small tub of vinyl spackling and a cheap putty knife. We prefer the vinyl type as it is much more elastic than standard drywall spackling. This product is already mixed and ready to go, just remove the lid.





(Left) After drying, a detail sander with medium grit paper was used to sand the dried spackling smooth, while holding a shop vac hose next to the sander to prevent the dust from settling on the finished grass areas.

(Right) The "new" concrete area now has a firm base to add the foam and structures.







(left) Our material of choice for concrete or asphalt surfaces is a product from Hobby Lobby. It has had several names, Silly Foam, Funky Foam, and recently Silly Winks. It comes in smaller sheets such as 8×12 . Or a larger size as shown, 12×18 .

It is a closed cell foam product so it will bend and conform as needed, is glued to the layout with "Tacky Glue" and takes craft paints quite well.






(Left) Instead of trying to cut the foam in such a large piece, the template was divided in two. Lines were traced on the back of the foam, then the foam was cut to shape. Here both pieces of the foam were prepainted the "aged concrete" color prior to installation as trying to paint the edges after installation would be impossible. As in real life, we wanted a smooth transition between the concrete and the gravel or grass.

(Right) The completed Truck Loading Platform is ready to install. One piece of the 0.060 sheet styrene was used as the base for the structure, and a second, shorter piece was glued underneath to match the height of the foam concrete.

Once the exact placement of the platform was determined, marks were made on the foam and a cut out, the shape of the smaller bottom piece of styrene, was cut and removed. The overhang on the ends covers the hole and provides more stability.








(Right) The view of the Spectators. Sometimes details cover up other details, be we know they are there.


CHICAGO & NORTH WESTERN HISTORICAL SOCIETY
