

News report from Fox 4 in Kansas City...(Edited for content)

On Monday, (June 27), an Amtrak train hit a dump truck at a public crossing and derailed near Mendon, north of Marshall. The incident occurred about 100 miles northeast of Kansas City. The Southwest Chief train was en-route to Chicago from Los Angeles with 275 passengers on board and 12 crew members.


The Missouri State Highway Patrol said the train had eight cars: seven derailed.

As of this writing, 4 people died in the collision and at least 150 others were injured.



The highway patrol said two women, age 56 and 57 who were sisters. The two passengers were pronounced deceased at the scene.







An 82-year-old male of Kansas City was also a passenger killed in the crash. He was pronounced dead at University Hospital in Columbia.


The driver of the truck that the train hit was also pronounced dead at the scene.

The National Transportation Safety Board held another news conference Wednesday, providing more information on its investigation.

NTSB Chair Jennifer Homendy said investigators determined the train was going 87 mph when it hit the truck. The speed limit is 90 mph.

She emphasized how steep the incline is leading up to the crossing. She said Thursday they will take a vehicle to reenact coming up the incline so investigators can see exactly what drivers see when they come over the crossing. Homendy said the agency has concluded there were no mechanical issues with the Amtrak train.

Homendy said there are thousands of passive crossings like this one across the U.S., but right now she's focused on getting this one in Mendon fixed.

On Monday, June 13<sup>th</sup>, a Westbound grain train was waiting for a crew change in the Dodge City, Kansas yard. The lead unit is BNSF 8171, a GE ES44C4, while the trailing unit is BNSF 6592, also a GE ES44C4 built in April of 2013.





On Thursday, June 23<sup>rd</sup> I found this veteran parked in the Dodge City, Kansas yard. BNSF 681 is a GE C44-9W that came to life in August of 1994 as ATSF 681. Time and mileage have not been kind and the cherry on top was a turbo fire.





It was a Tuesday in Dodge city, Kansas, June 14<sup>th</sup> when I spotted this oddball in the BNSF yard. SFGX 1010 is a slug belonging to Archer Daniels Midland. It was in the middle of a train, so it was leaving or returning from the ADM elevator. 1010 has no engine of its own, only traction motors, and must get its power from another locomotive.

It was originally built by EMD in 1950 as Louisville & Nashville #2247, a 1,000-horsepower SW7.



It was rebuilt by General Electric in June 1979 as Southern Pacific SL-4B Slug #1010.



Union Pacific retired #1010 in 2000. Dick Samuels purchased it for use on the Molalla branch, but it was never used and was kept stored along SE McBrod Avenue near the Milwaukie shops.

In late 2007, #1010 was sold to Archer Daniels Midland for use at a grain elevator in Kansas.







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

The Scenery Crew of the WKR N-scale layout are in the final phase of the concrete plant construction. The main structures are complete but before we can continue, we need to repair some transport damage. (Above) While transporting the layout, the edge of section 11 was compressed which crushed the foam base under the pavement.



(Left) How do you repair model concrete? The same way you repair real concrete. An oversize hole was removed from the concrete foam and a replacement piece was cut to fill the hole.

(Right) before the patch can be glued in place, we had to first repair the foam board base for support. We could have done a similar repair using a new piece of foam board, but the damage was slight, so we opted for paper towel soaked with Tacky Glue.






(Left) We could not find the exact formula paint to match, so we went with the light grey of new concrete to resemble a repair patch.



(Above) With the structures nearly complete, we needed to determine the proper positioning on the scene. After moving things around for a bit, this was position was determined to be the best for the remaining space available.




The footprint of the building was cut out so the structure can be slightly recessed for easy spotting during set-ups.



(Left) To recess the structure to the proper depth, we used 0.040" sheet styrene scraps to partially fill the spotting hole.

(Below) The structure needs to be removable for transport as it is too tall, so now it is easy to set in place, plus it is now recessed to the correct depth.



(Right) Two new retaining walls were needed, so we built the individual bricks and then the wall. These were glued to sheet styrene for additional support while gluing in the foam base.





(Above) Both retaining walls were painted and weathered and are ready to install. (Below) The retaining walls are glued in place.



(Below) We finally were able to find a photo of the Dodge City Concrete sign and it was installed along with bollards to protect the roll-up doors.





(Above) With the placement determined, we needed to remove some of the aggregate and dirt that had been placed before. This left the "concrete" stained so we used masking tape to section off the area and a slightly different concrete color repainted the area.





(Both) The current state of the project. Hopefully we will have this project concluded next month.


