


2/5/24...Phillipsburg, Ks. Jerry Bruce writes: "The **5002** former Utah Railway MK5000C, now Kyle Railroad locomotive sits quietly in the yard awaiting her gloomy future...Word is she and her close friend 5001 are scheduled NOT to be on a schedule! (running that is) Chopping block?"

The **MK5000C** is a 5,000 hp North American diesel-electric locomotive developed by MK Rail. At the time of its introduction in 1994, the MK5000C was the most powerful single prime mover diesel-electric locomotive ever made, a title it would hold for only for one year until GE Transportation released its competing 6,000 hp AC6000CW model in 1995.

The MK5000C was powered by the 5000 hp Caterpillar V12 3612 diesel engine. This diesel engine remains one of the largest engine blocks used in rail service in North America. The Cat 3612 features dual turbochargers that are liquid aftercooled.




The Kyle Railroad 1125 was built by EMD as a SW1000 for Denver and Rio Grande, number 146 in October of 1966.

The **EMD SW1000** is a model of 4-axle diesel switchers built by General Motors Electro-Motive Division between June 1966 and October 1972. Power was provided by an EMD 645E 8-cylinder engine which generated 1,000 horsepower. This locomotive was built on the same common frame as the EMD SW1500. The SW 1000 was taller than previous EMD switchers, which posed a problem for industrial customers: at many facilities, tight clearances existed, and the SW1000 exceeded them. As a result, most production went to railroads, not industries. A total of 114 EMD SW1000s were built for railroads and industrial operations in the United States.



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


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

The Rear View





2024 marks the 10-year anniversary of the construction of the Western Kansas Rails N-scale layout, so we will be taking a look in the rear-view mirror to see the changes.

Last month we looked at the construction of sixteen straight sections and four corner sections. Once complete, all were painted white internally and painted flat black on the sides and underside.

Banquet table leg sets were added to each section, a pair on each straight, with a single leg on each corner (due to space constraints).

(Left) This picture displays the difference in height between the standard table legs and the extended versions.

The NTrak standard for height is forty-inches from the floor to the top of the rails. We decided to make it easier to duck under, and so changed the height standard to forty-five-inches.

(Right) A leg set was taken to Home Depot where we found a size of PVC pipe that slipped right over the metal legs. We purchased some sections of pipe, end caps, and screws.

The length of PVC pipe was calculated, pieces cut, end caps glued on, then each is attached to the metal legs with three screws.

Note the sections are ready to join together.





The Rear View



(Above) **The Sippin' & Switchin' Society of North Carolina** loaned us a steel template for their module ends showing the four holes needed for the alignment pins. Here the template is clamped in place and is ready for drilling the holes.

(Below) The four holes are drilled. The Society standard uses ¾-inch metal pipe for alignment pins, but we could not find any in Garden City, so we substituted ¾-inch wood dowels, but the metal pins are better. In this view, two of the wood dowel pins are glued in place.





(Left) The first two sections, numbers 3 and 4 are ready to join. The wooden dowel pins were slightly tapered on the ends so they would slide in easily, but the full diameter of the dowel was near the base of the pin to make sure the alignment was the same each time.

(Right) The two sections are now joined together and c-clamped from below. Before any track was added, the seam was sanded to remove any blemishes and the seam was smooth.

Each section in turn was added to the layout until the circle was complete, then the two interior yard sections were added also.

Using this alignment system allows us to set up quickly without using the small track pieces crossing the seam on each track on each section joint.





The **Friends of the Burlington Northern Railroad** (**FOBNR**) historical society was chartered to gather, preserve, and share information about the history and the current operations of the Burlington Northern Railroad. The group began with about 140 members absorbed from the Burlington Northern Historical Society. In 1996, following the merger between Burlington Northern and Santa Fe, the group voted to follow the Burlington Northern from 1970 to 1995 and the BNSF from 1995 to the present. Then in 2018 we added coverage of the Montana Rail Link.



The Group's quarterly publication, *The BN Expediter*, is the voice of the organization that shares news about the group's activities, BN historical data, and current operations of the railroad. It is currently a 30+ page all-color publication and will grow even larger as the society grows and more members contribute more information.





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

The ALCO C-643DH, also known as the Century 643DH, was a twin-engine, diesel-hydraulic locomotive, featuring the ALCO 251C prime movers.

It was the first diesel-hydraulic road switcher built in the United States and was designed to directly compete with the Krauss-Maffei ML-4000. It had a C-C wheel arrangement and generated 4,300 horsepower.

Only three were built, all for Southern Pacific Railroad in 1964 (#9018–#9020). The Alco C-643DHs joined 21 Krauss-Maffei ML-4000 diesel-hydraulics already on the Southern Pacific's roster. They spent most of their service lives in the flat San Joaquin Valley in California.

Dissatisfaction over the poor performance of diesel-hydraulic locomotives, as well as their use of foreign-made components (the hydraulic transmission was of German Voith design), eventually led Southern Pacific to sell the 3 C-643DHs for scrap in 1973.

None of the 3 examples built survived into preservation.

(Right) Just after the doors opened on Saturday, the first families looking for fun worked their way through the vendors and arrived in model train heaven.






The **Chisholm Trail Division, NMRA** displayed their HO-scale modular layout. It was one of the largest layouts in the show and featured impressive scenery.


The table offered a variety of waterbased paints, small glasses of water, paint brushes, and several types of scenery materials such as grass and trees.

The latest in HO scale modular model railroading

Free-mo was developed with the idea that a set of standards focusing mainly on module endplates would enable faithful modeling of prototype track plans and operations in a modular environment. The length and track configuration of a Free-mo module or module set is up to the modeler. Free-mo takes the boredom out of running trains monotonously around a double or even a triple track mainline. With Free-mo, less is more.

Free-mo operates like a permanent or sectional layout but still retains its modularity. Free-mo layouts are operated with a single track mainline in a point to loop, loop to loop, or point to point. Layout sizes can vary to any size conceivable.

Membership

Free-mo is not a club or even an organization. Free-mo is a set of standards for building Prototype Model Train Modules. Some clubs have adopted the Free-mo Standard as their club module standard. Other groups have published their own Standards based off the Free-mo Standard. Some are a copy of the standards posted here, others have added more to their standards; so long as their standards still meet the Free-mo standards they are still Free-mo.



Back in January at the McPherson, Kansas Train Show, we were poking around the **Spring Creek Model Trains** display and came across a three-pack from Bluford Shops MoPac wood chip hoppers.

Although these would be a little old for our "modern" MoPac layout, we calculated we could weather them to make them look much older but still in service.





(Above) The three new hoppers right out of the box. These would be older MoPac coal hoppers with extensions on top as wood chips are lighter than coal. These could also be a "pattern" for us to modify some of our MoPac coal hoppers towards our Achievement Program requirements in the future.



When you combine a car with fishing line weights and Tacky Glue, you get a car that tracks better, derails less, and performs more like the real car. The newer cars or modified older cars with metal wheel sets have a much lower rolling resistance, allowing an increase in weight.

These cars from the factory are correctly weighted, but we decided to double the original weight.





(Left) The factory cars come in just over ½-ounce on the scale.

(Right) We added weights until the scale read nearly 1-1/2-ounces.





(Left) The first task is to use a pair of plyers to gently close the weights together (they are designed to clamp on fishing line) to save space. We wish to keep the weights as low as possible, which in this case were the discharge chutes.

We used tweezers to test place the weights in the car and after were satisfied, they were removed, and a layer of Tacky Glue was applied inside the car. The weights were then placed where they were before.

(Right) After we were satisfied everything was where it was supposed to be, a second layout of Tacky Glue was applied to seal everything in.





(Left) We wished to make these new hoppers appear to be remnants of an earlier age, so we got on the internet and looked for photos. We did not find any of these exact cars, but picked out three examples of later cars which gave us three different amounts of "age".

(Below) Once the glue is mostly dry, we can proceed. If you keep the loads in place, you can skip this step, however if you wish to do "loads in, empties out" as we do during op sessions, we need to paint the weights to match the car color.





(Left) The Paint Shop keeps a good selection of acrylic craft paints on hand, so the Paint Master chose two colors to blend to match the MoPac "Boxcar Brown".

We use old plastic bags that parts that are stiff enough and are disposable to mix colors. We used the dark brown as a base, then added in small amounts of bright red until the proper match. We test this with a tiny amount applied to the inside of the car then let it dry (colors can change after drying).

(Below) After painting, the weights are not hidden, but less noticeable.



(Right) The Weathering Department took over the project and set-up a work area with a photo of the desired weathering, a small plastic dish with a big drop of dark brown paint and a small amount of water plus a small paint brush.

(Below) The paint is drying, but this is the first and most heavily weathered car 290. We added the paint by dabbing the color on in small patches and went back and added more as some areas were too lightly applied.




(Below) The next step was to add dark brown weathering powder to the undersides.






