

#### NOTES FROM PRESIDENT HANK KRAICHELY

I would like to thank all the members who supported me in the election of 2015. This might seem odd since election results were announced some nine months ago but the 1st quarter 2016 issue of the Caboose Kibitzer is the first issue published since January 2015. (News in this area will be covered later in this column.)

Last Fall was a busy period filled with administrative business. This was a necessary, but less than exciting effort. The Region Regulations were edited, removing out-dated material such as Region dues and Caboose Kibitzer subscriptions. This tedious effort was accomplished by a small committee comprised of Whit Johnson—Convention & Membership Chair, Larry Diehl—Director for the Turkey Creek Division, John Garavaglia—Region Attorney and myself. The Regulations were reviewed by the Officers and the Board of Directors and then modifications were made at the BOD meeting. Through a series of votes on specific sections and paragraphs the document was approved and the revised Regulations, incorporating the BOD modifications, were emailed to the BOD for a final review.

Several additions have been made to the MCoR staff. Replacing Bob Amsler as Region Attorney is John Garavaglia, a St. Louisin and O Scale MoPac modeler. Due to the resignations of Ted Tschirhart and Lewis Seibel, Alan Aagaard has been appointed Editor of the Caboose Kibitzer leaving the position of Caboose

Kibitizer Advertising Manager open. Rounding out the changes, the relocation of Stephen August to North Carolina created an opening for Membership Chair. I am happy to announce that Whit Johnson has accepted the additional position of Membership Chairman. We thank these men for their service supporting the Mid-Continent Region.

THE ROAD TO OMAHA—HOSTED BY WESTERN HERITAGE DIV.



Non-rail opportunities include Lauritzen Gardens, site of an impressive garden railroad and Kennefick Park where one can look out over the Missouri River Valley from the running boards of the Big Boy and the Centennial locomotives. The Durham Western Heritage Museum also combines impressive displays commemorating the history of the area, situated in the historic Union Station where thousands of travelers entered and exited Omaha. That museum also has rail displays as well – of passenger cars and locomotives.

The MCOR Convention this year is coming to Council Bluffs! The convention hotel will be the Hilton Garden (2702 Mid America Dr, Council Bluffs) which is easily reached from the I29-I80 Interstate exit #1B. From that venue, many attractions in both Omaha and the Bluffs are within easy reach. The non-rail and rail opportunities include organized prototype tours to the UP Heritage Fleet Shops on Friday, June 3, and to the Harriman Dispatch Center on Saturday, June 4. Another tour opportunity to the Henry Doorly Zoo Railroad Shops is pending at this time. The zoo offers outstanding opportunities for families to view animals in a variety of well-designed habitats.





Branching out, visitors to Omaha and the Bluffs can view art at the Joslyn Art Museum on Dodge Street, attend children's theatre at the Rose, and participate in children's activities nearby at the Omaha Children's Museum. After tours and before, numerous restaurants and shopping venues are available in the Old Market, near the Durham Western Heritage Museum. Amtrak and other railroad views are available from the 10<sup>th</sup> Street overpass adjacent to the museum.

In Council Bluffs, attendees can visit the Union Pacific Museum, and the General Dodge

House, as well as the Rails West Museum, situated in the Rock Island Depot. There are also outside displays there, including a UP 4-8-4! These venues, as well as others in Omaha (near the Old Market) are within the 5-mile radius covered by the free hotel shuttle.

The area is home to several outstanding model railroads both from the modeling and operations standpoints. Attendees will have the opportunity to both visit and operate.



Attendees will also have the opportunity to attend the Train Show and Swap Meet sponsored by the Nebraska-Iowa Railroaders to be held in Ralston, Nebraska at the Ralston Arena during the weekend of the show. This is a highly successful show, which will have layouts as well as

vendors. It will be possible to register for this show when you register for the convention. People interested in exhibiting or obtaining tables at the show can also find the contact information via our convention web page <a href="http://www.whd.mcor-nmra.org/convention/">http://www.whd.mcor-nmra.org/convention/</a>

When one is attending the convention activities at the Hilton Garden, the program will include numerous clinics, among which is a photo presentation Thursday evening by David Seidel, President of the Camerail Club of Omaha, titled "Railroading in Omaha and Council Bluffs Through the Lens of Ray Lowery" covering a 60+ year span. John Bush will present "Building 844" based on his book of the same topic, and many clinics related to operations and modeling. Please also plan to bring models to enter in our contests – both judged and by popular vote. Categories are listed on our website for the convention. Awards will be presented at the Saturday night Awards Banquet, which will feature the celebrated 'Whisky Steak', offered by the hotel as part of their buffet dinner. Saturday's Banquet will feature Mr. Bob Krieger as our guest speaker. Bob Krieger of Cheyenne, WY is Secretary of the Sherman Hill Model RR Club. He is also the Business Manager of the



#### **OMAHA'S HIDDEN SHORTLINE**

Welcome to the Omaha Zoo Railroad! Pictured above are the two oil fired steam locomotives that provide the passenger service on our line. The Omaha Zoo Railroad was built in the 1968 with help from the Union Pacific Railroad.

With just under 2 miles of 30" gauge mainline built on the bluffs along the Missouri River, this shortline railroad hauls several hundred people daily during the operating season. Climbing up 4% grades and then descending down the next, this is a challenging railroad. The railroad has a two track engine house with cranes, service pit, and machine tools to assist in the maintenance and service of the equipment. When originally constructed, there were four stations along the line. Omaha, Pachyderm Hill, Promontory, and Kennefick were the four stations. Currently we are

operating with two of the stations, Omaha and Kennefick. Omaha station is the original location where water, fuel, and service were completed on the locomotives while passengers were loaded. Today, Omaha is the location of the engine house where we also repair and rebuild the rolling stock and motive power.

The original locomotive is a Crown Locomotive model of the Union Pacific #119. It was built for the zoo as a 5/8 scale model to operate on 30" gauge track. This locomotive has operated the line with as many as 5 cars in revenue service. Currently we are operating the 119 with a 4 car train set as our primary train Monday—Thursday , and as the second section on weekends. The 119 operates with a boiler pressure set at 200 PSI using Diesel fuel for the atomized oil fire. With

the six chime whistle this locomotive is a treat to hear.

The workhorse at the Omaha Zoo Railroad is engine #104. Originally built in 1890, #104 served the Romanian State Railway until the late 1960's. Thanks to the generosity of Plasser & Theurer, an Austrian manufacturer of maintenance equipment, the "Riva" joined the roster in the 1974. The "Austrian" as we call her was converted to oil fire, air brakes were added, and she entered service in 1977. The #104 typically handles a 6—7 car set operating on weekends, holidays, and

special events early Spring to late Fall.

The newest addition to the motive power roster is a Plymouth 40 Ton Diesel that was originally built to 36" gauge and later gauged to 30". This engine was acquired in 2008 and has recently gone through a rebuild and paint upgrade.

Whenever you get the chance to visit Omaha, make sure to stop by the Omaha Zoo Railway for some rail fan action while the family is visiting the over 50,000 animals that can also be found here.

Layout Description

The railroad represents the New York Central's Hudson Division from just north of Harmon to Stuyvesant, NY. A small portion of the New York City Terminal District, including the interlocking at Spuyten Duyvil, is also modeled. As with the prototype, there is a heavy emphasis on passenger train operation, based on a 1951 ETT and freight train documents. During this era, most commuter trains were still steam powered, shortly before RDC's bumped steam off the Peekskill trains. We run roughly 30 trains during a typical operating session over roughly 9 scale miles of multiple main track with the fast clock set at 3 to 1. Op sessions cover 8 hours on the fast clock (2'45"). Operating positions required include 5 yard jobs, 3 tower operators, a dispatcher, and 10 mainline engineers/conductors to handle the freight, mail and express, and milk trains in addition to the passenger traffic. The railroad is roughly 15% scenicked.

**Motive Power** Steam and first generation diesels, of which about 66% are sound equipped.

yard, and as close to track for track as possible. Train schedules, passenger and freight consists, switching and blocking have been carefully reconstructed to match the prototype. Each session represents an eight hour segment of the clock. Barstow requires two yardmasters, and three switch jobs per shift to handle the many work events and classification. As a former Santa Fe Agent at Barstow in the late 60's remarked, "it seemed like we had to mess with every train." Westbound passenger trains change power, and several car lines make connections between trains. Operations include famous trains like the San Francisco Chief, California Livestock Special, City of Los Angeles, Phoenix Fast Freight, the QLA, the SWG, and many others. Victorville, Boron, Cadiz and Milligan are also represented.

### LEATHERSTOCKINGS & THE BLUES EXPRESS

In 1865, the Cooperstown & Susquehanna Valley Railroad (C&SVRR) was founded. The original 16 miles of track was broad gauge [6' (1829mm)] to be compatible with the Albany & Susquehanna RR until 1876 when this track was "narrowed up" to modern standard gauge. The Cooperstown & Charlotte Valley (CACV) RR evolved from some of this road and ended up as a rural feeder to the Delaware & Hudson. Passenger service was very important in the mid-1800's but mixed general freight was also moved besides lumber and a specialty crop

for the region, hops. At one time, Otsego County NY produced some of the best hops in the world and the Busch family visited so often to inspect the hops crops for their brewery that they built a country estate in the area.

The Leatherstocking Railway Historical Society (LRHS) was organized in 1982 to preserve local railroad historical equipment and develop a regional railroad museum. The next year, the LRHS became affiliated

(Continued on page 39)

with the National Railroad Historical Society. Through community fundraising the LRHS began acquiring railroad equipment and options on railroad-associated real estate. It ran its first excursion train in 1983. In 1993, it was offered an opportunity to purchase the former CACV and its 16 miles of right of way from Cooperstown Junction to the Village of Cooperstown. The LHRS parlayed heavy local fundraising into matching parts of federal and NYDOT grants totaling over \$1.5 million. They then began acquisition of the needed equipment and facilities to operate a heritage railroad.



Facilities now include the 20'x70' wood frame Milford (NY) Station which was erected in 1869 and now serves as the focal point for passenger operations. A small museum is also in the building as well as some of the Society's historical archives and a running HO model railroad. The property also included a 35' x 85' steel Engine House built in 1973. A run-through track and an inspection pit allow the volunteers to bring equipment inside for restoration and repair.

In 1999, renovation of the northern 8 miles of the CACV between Milford and Cooperstown was completed including safety certification inspections of three steel bridges. The LHRS ran their first revenue passenger train shortly after and has been running trains ever since. A 1.5 ft. gauge railroad originally built by a local enthusiast now circles the Milford property and runs for visi-

tors during the summer. The engines and cars used in running the trains are kept at the Milford Station tracks. Other equipment awaiting restoration is stored on nearby tracks and 8 miles south in Cooperstown Junction.





The LHRS owns and operates two ex-Canadian National switch engines of ALCO S-4 and S-7 design. Both were also used previously by the Atlas Steel Mill in Ontario to shuttle scrap metal around their facility. Both are products of the Montreal Locomotive Works (MLW) which was the Canadian successor to ALCO. CACV No. 3051 is painted in a D&H color scheme with CACV lettering. No. 8223 is newly painted in the colors of CN, its previous owner. One of the switchers pulls the typical passenger train from Milford to Cooperstown and back, utilizing the runaround track at Cooperstown.

The LRHS, with their own personnel, operates a wide variety of specialty trains for adults and children planned around the Easter Bunny, Train Robberies, Railfan Day, Dinosaur Express, Oktoberfest, Beer & Wine Tasting Days, Ice Cream Social Train, Santa Express, Christmas Lights, and several others. Regularly scheduled trains include weekly Thursday day excursions, Dinner Trains, and the Saturday Night Blues Express May through September.



Actually the music on the three hour Blues Express can vary to suit the riders' taste. We rode the Express in September of this year and an entire car was rented by a wedding party so the music was livelier. We guessed we were in for a good time when the bride boarded in her white dress wearing cowboy boots! The band is located in the last car, an open gondola. Since a steady cold rain was falling the evening we rode, the tent covering was installed over a metal framework (see photo) and the party went on. The coach just forward contained a cash bar, food sales, music piped in from the gondola and



some tables. We rode in the next coach forward equipped with tables and chairs. Another coach still forward had been rented entirely for the wedding party and contained their dinner buffet.

A friendly gentleman appropriately dressed as a conductor introduced himself to Barb and I as president of the LRHS and their Cooperstown and Charlotte Valley Railroad. In the course of our talk, he invited me to ride in the locomotive during our engine runaround in Cooperstown. This was a first for me made more memorable as it was done on a dark rainy night. For the Blues Express, the LRHS only provides the train. The promoter, who also ended up at our table, rents the whole train, markets the reservations and tickets, holds the liquor license, etc..



Volunteers do much of the maintenance tasks and restorations themselves. Authenticity is valued but if more recent inventions are superior, they will be substituted. For instance, the heavy-weight coaches each originally had a 32 vdc gen-

erator run off an axle on that car. Now 110 vac is supplied to the entire train from a single onboard generator which allows the use of standard 110v fixtures.

Any member who wants to be trained for train service can be. The LRHS has their own rule book that the trainees must abide by. They work with already qualified conductors, brakemen, and engineers until they successfully complete a "qualifying run" where they must show they have mastered all the safety protocols as well as the



Rules of the Road.

The Leatherstocking Society has over 300 members and has made its railroad an integral part of the local culture. The Society recruits present and future members by presenting slide shows at

community organization meetings and at local schools. The members keep busy maintaining the rolling stock and doing maintenance-of-way. It seems to me the members could write a How-To manual on creating and running a heritage railroad and attracting the needed volunteers to make it all possible. Morale seems high and the fellows are very proud of their railroad. We felt privileged to be their guests.

**Author's Note:** Leatherstocking is not a railroad term but was popularized by James Fenimore Cooper when he wrote the five "Leatherstocking Tales" in the early 1800's. The most well-known of the Tales is "The Last of the Mohicans" set in this general area of upper New York State.





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
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
