



1^{st} Quarter 2018




Notes from the Editor's Desk

""Learning to be a Brakeman,
the
Hard way"

y the time I came to the Katy in 1966, I was National Arbitration Board Award 282 in 1963, did just

y the time I came to the Katy in 1966, I was something of a seasoned veteran, having service as both a fireman and brakeman on two different railroads. But my experience had begun five years earlier with a very rocky start.

In 1961, I was a freshman in college and working part time for a small dry goods store in Coffeyville, Kansas for the princely sum of \$20 a week. One afternoon a friend of mine came by the store and asked if I could leave work a little early and take him down to the local Missouri Pacific Railroad yard, where they were hiring a Fireman, a job which would pay as much in one day as I had been making in an entire week. To make a long story short, he didn't get the job, but I did. I became the newest employee on the railroad, with the dirtiest, most undesirable job they had, that of **"hostler's helper"** working the graveyard shift.

I quickly found out that a hostler was the engineer that moved engines around the dump, which was how the service tracks were collectively known. Somehow "dump" seemed appropriate, given the mud, grime, and numerous puddles of oil one had to wade through constantly. The helper was the "grunt" that was expected to keep up with him, fuel, sand, water, sweep and generally muck out locomotives, align switches, clean the crapper in the locker room, and just about any other thing the hostler was unable (or unwilling) to do. It was hot, dirty, and unless you happen to like the smell of sweat and diesel fuel, extremely unpleasant work. The job did not require a great deal of explanation or training, and I was, therefore, given little of either. As a fireman I was only a temporary necessity in the railroad's eyes since there was a national push

to eliminate "feather bedders" on all, but the few remaining passenger trains. In fact,

National Arbitration Board Award 282 in 1963, did just that. When that finally did happen I had not been around long enough to develop a bad reputation with the trainmaster, and he sent word that I could stay on to cover the needs of the switchman and brakeman's extra board right there in Coffeyville.

Now remember my total training had revolved around putting sand in the top of the engines and fuel in the bottom. Not much had been said about anything else since apparently they had not wanted to confuse me with extraneous details. The day-to-day operations of the railroad were still a vague and mysterious thing to me.

I caught my first run in my new capacity, on one cold December night during the 1963 Christmas vacation. I stopped by the yard office on my way home from school, and when I walked into the crew clerk's office door and reported in, I was immediately "called" for the Dexter Local. I had just enough time to change my clothes and grab a snack before train time. I had no idea where to find Dexter on the map, or for that matter, what a "local" was.

I reported to the Roundhouse and found that I was to be a "Rear Brakeman". The old conductor had a very bad cold and an equally bad disposition, and nearly fainted when he found out that I had neither a rule book nor a timetable. The embarrassed clerk quickly supplied me with both, and after reading me the Operating and Safety Rules for the day, the conductor instructed me to walk our train, checking for any hand brakes that might need to be released, and then to build a warm fire in the caboose. OK, I could figure out the hand brake thing, and I made it to the caboose without getting lost, but this was

my first encounter with a coal-fired pot bellied stove. I had no idea how to start a fire in the thing, and after a half a box of matches, it was still a cold, dark caboose. About that time a carman came through the caboose door to complete the air test of the train. He was as cold as I was and therefore inclined to help me with the fire thingy. It seems the first thing you do is to carry the ash pan to the back platform and bang it loudly on the end railing. Now I knew where all those little white dusty pyramids on the yard tracks had come from. After that you shoveled in about four good scoops of coal and shoved a burning red railroad flare (known as a fusee) down among the pile, quickly slamming the door on the thing before the heavy sulfur fumes suffocated everyone in the vicinity. With a little luck, in a few minutes, you had a roaring fire. After the caboose got rolling, the draft really got the thing cherry red, and once lit, a small stove can keep a very large caboose quite warm and toasty with very little attention. By the time we picked up the conductor at the yard office, the carman had shown me how to fill, light, and hang up the marker lamps on the back, making us officially a "train".

I felt I was ready for the old conductor's inspection and approval. Not to be. Where was the coffee? Then I discovered that above all else, it was the rear brakeman's job to have a pot of fresh, strong and extremely hot coffee ready when the boss arrived. I quickly retrieved the beat up old tin coffee pot from the shelf and walked to the sink to wash it out, since it had an amazing collection of grounds and something that looked like dirty little black Frisbees up to the half way point. I was reaching for a container of soap when the conductor noticed and in rather strong language imparted the first three primary lessons in railroad culinary etiquette. Lesson No. 1 is to never wash a coffee pot with soap, followed by even more important Lesson No. 2 never wash the conductor's coffee cup at all. You simply dump the pot when you can no longer get enough new stuff in the thing to make "HIS" cup of coffee, and if the floating coffee grounds bother you, break an egg into the boiling pot. As it cooks and sinks, it takes the grounds to the bottom, hence the dirty little Frisbees I had noticed earlier. They actually had been eggs at one

time in their life. And soap of any kind and in any quantity forever ruins a pot or a cup. Coffee cups are never to be touched, and are supposed to look like you just used them to drain your crankcase. His did, so I guess it was a very good cup after all. **Lesson No. 3** was that most people use far too much water making coffee. It should pour slow and make you pucker to be really good. My evening was not getting off to a good start.

We went about eight miles on the main track to a small junction at Dearing, Kansas, and it was my job to hop off the moving caboose, align the switches, lock and check to see that the points were tight, and then run to catch the caboose, which was now about as far down the track as you could reasonably expect to be able to catch, considering you had on long johns, a winter coat and heavy boots. I made it, but only just, and the conductor was not happy with my delaying his train.

Our first stop was at Caney, Kansas, where we crossed the ATSF and had to switch a small grain elevator. The elevator was actually on the ATSF, and we had to go out onto their mainline a short distance to get to it. The train pulled to a stop and the conductor and I had to walk over to the head end to help switch the small industry. There was a high wooden trestle going into town, and it had no walkways. Instead, the section men had placed long 2" x 12" boards across a running stream, which in the dark seemed close to the Royal Gorge in depth and width. I said a prayer and followed the daredevil ahead of me across the bouncing boards, hoping the caboose would be somewhere else when we returned.

I was left at the junction switch with instructions to "flag". Here was another mystery. To me a flag was something you saluted in Boy Scouts, but I had absolutely no idea how it applied to railroading. Besides, I did not have one, so.... Sure enough, about ten minutes after my crew disappeared down the ATSF main track, one of their freight trains showed up, and not knowing what else to do, I waved at their Engineer and watched them roll by. Not good. They almost went into the elevator on top of my crew. The conductor spent a good ten minutes describing the sorry state of my family tree. At least that was the gist of it; he was talking too fast for me to remember all of it.

After the ATSF train got by us and my engines returned to "our" train, we got back on the caboose and headed off to the west. At least this time the caboose came to us and I did not need to brave the makeshift foot bridge again.

The next stop was at Sedan, Kansas, where we switched a small elevator. The radio on the caboose had quit about a mile or so out of town, and we discovered the belt had slipped off the pulley under the caboose. The conductor had me help lever the thing back together, a chore he had obviously done many times before. Before long, we were on the air again and in communication with the rest of the world. We made one more stop at a small country siding, where we "dropped" a box car of hay out of a spur track to our train on the main line. As "Rear Brakeman" it was my job to ride the top platform and control the speed of the car using its handbrake, a real thrill if you have never done it before in the dark. Actually, I guessed the right time to crank the brake down, and made a rather gentle coupling. I expected congratulations but got none.

Once again, we were on our way. A real challenge awaited us at Dexter, but one that everyone but I seemed to understand perfectly. Three locals met there at the same time, one from Arkansas City, one from Winfield, and our train out of Coffeyville. Both the other jobs had arrived first and had made their exchanges. When we arrived, we pulled down the main track and stopped with our caboose east of the siding switch. The plan was to leave our caboose uphill on the main, and after the rest of the train had pulled to the west end, release the hand brake and allow it to roll into a short siding. When our engines returned with our train, they would back in to couple on the caboose and be ready to leave for our return to Coffeyville. A simple maneuver, perhaps. That is, unless you had a green brakeman on the crew who did not know that a caboose had two handbrake wheels, one on each end. I had let the one off the rear way back in Coffeyville, but had neglected to notice that a "creeper" had been wound down on the one on the leading end. It had not been noticed during the entire trip, but still had just enough of a drag to slow the caboose down so that it died halfway through the switch. Again, the conductor about my linage and my prospects for a long life. The experience was not a total waste of time since I was able to find out then how a caboose chain works. Retrieving a fifty foot chain from the tool box slung beneath our caboose, the conductor signaled one of the other local's engines to come up and hooked the chain between our caboose coupler and theirs. We gave our caboose a little tug and it rolled into the siding just where it should have been all along, but with a lot of laughter from the other crews which my conductor took quite personally. He shared some of his earlier observations with them, and my position in the food chain dropped even further. I was given orders to ride the head end of the train on the return trip. The "Captain" has apparently had enough of the new kid to last him the rest of the trip.

Our engines were two of the Midland Valley black and red GP-7 units that had come to the Missouri Pacific through the recent merger of the two railroads. The accommodations were rather Spartan and since there were only three seats on the locomotive (and now four people in the cab with me the junior member), I sat on the floor all the way back to Coffeyville. It somehow seemed appropriate, and after an uneventful return trip we put our train away. I went to the yard office to offer my thanks to the conductor for teaching me a little about railroading, only to find that he had deposited his waybills and quickly left for home, telling the caller that he would be off "sick" for an unspecified period of time. I never saw the conductor again nor had the opportunity to offer my apologies or anything else.

So much for my first trip as a brakeman. I think I might have been the reason the railroad decided to begin a formal training school for new brakemen rather than throwing them to the wolves and trusting to luck and the generosity of the "old heads". Compassion had seemed in short supply at 3 a.m. in the middle of Kansas. I made other trips on the Dexter Local, all under the watchful eye of a different conductor, and with a little more experience under my belt I was able to keep up and contribute a little better. I guess some lessons truly are

learned best the hard way.





"Sadie" is owned by Gramling Locomotive Works, run by the father-son team of John and Barney Gramling who restore steam tank engines at their farmstead in Indiana and take them to tourist railroads and museums, according to <u>Trains</u> Magazine. "Sadie" had to share the limelight with another train engine at this year's Railfest event. Union Pacific brought its one-of-a-kind diesel-electric locomotive #1982 that is painted to commemorate the Missouri Pacific Railroad. The Mo-Pac Railroad played a significant role in Wichita's early years.

Other Railfest activities included a miniature G-scale train display by the Wichita Area Garden Railway Society, a toy train layout by the Wichita Toy Train Club and Museum, an outdoor market on the upper level of Union Station, and tours through the Great Plains Transportation Museum. There were raffles and giveaways of model train sets and collectible trains, too. Food merchants at Union Station had Railfest specials, and food trucks also were available.

Railfest is the museum's major fundraising event, Meek said. "It was created because we needed a fundraiser and we needed something that provides outreach to the community in a manner that people of all ages and interests can enjoy," he said. "It costs a lot of money to keep vintage railroad equipment stable in an outdoor environment."




























"D & M Railway" by David & Marie Rothenberger located on North Joann Street in Wichita, KS




"LJM Railway" by Larry & Marylou Dawley and Joe & Leigh Ann Dawley located on East Blake Avenue in Wichita, KS



fort. Eventually the Dawley's pla to expand their railroad to three houses in a row as a real family enterprise!








"PGH & H Railway" ("Live Steam" by Bob Wald located in O.J. Watson Park on South McLean Blvd. in Wichita, KS
